Imperial College London is one of the world's leading science-focused universities, committed to making advances in research and education, to making lasting contributions to society, and with great ambition for its future. Multi-cultural, global in outlook and reach, Imperial consistently achieves one of the highest rankings nationally and internationally.

The College has three faculties: Engineering, Medicine and Natural Sciences and the Business School, as well as a significant number of interdisciplinary research centres which work on the great challenges of the day, such as climate and environmental change, energy supply, security and global health.

Established in 1907 in London's scientific and cultural heartland in South Kensington, the College was initially

a merger of the Royal College of Science, the City and Guilds College and the Royal School of Mines. The Faculty of Medicine was formed from a merging of St Mary's Hospital Medical School, the National Heart and Lung Institute, Charing Cross and Westminster Medical School, and the Royal Postgraduate Medical School.

In more recent years, the UK's first Academic Health Science Centre (AHSC) was established. The College is also a founding partner of the Francis Crick Institute, an inter-disciplinary medical research institute opened in 2016. The Business School is a key player offering a full range of courses and degrees and conducting research that benefits from being in the world's leading financial and business capital.

Facts and Figures

The College:

- is home to **17,000 students** and **8,000 staff** (half of whom are research and academic staff);
- ranks consistently in the top 5 universities in Europe and top 10 worldwide;
- is an international community, attracting undergraduates from over **125 countries** and staff with **117 different nationalities**;
- places excellence in education at the core of its ethos and is reflected in UK and international rankings.
- is home to the greatest concentration of **high-impact research** of any major UK university.
- has one of the **highest incomes** in the UK Higher Education sector;
- holds an **Institutional Silver Athena Swan** award, recognising women's academic careers in science, technology and engineering
- has had many distinguished members, including **14 Nobel laureates**, **two Fields Medallists**, and many members of the Royal Society and national Academies.

Travel information

Imperial College is at a few minutes of walk from South Kensington tube station (underground). The station is reachable from any international airport of London.

Heathrow airport. (Suggested transportation: underground.) From the airport, take the Piccadilly underground line towards South Kensington station. The journey takes around 55 minutes. Oyster cards (see ticket section) can be purchased directly at the airport at the underground gates. Otherwise you can pay with a contactless debit/credit card.

Gatwick airport. (Suggested transportation: Southern railways train.) From the airport, take the train to London Victoria. There are two train companies serving the airport: Southern Railway and Gatwick Express. Southern Railway is cheaper and takes about the same time of the Gatwick Express. Moreover, if you take the Southern Express you can use the Oyster card (or contactless debit/credit card) and there is no need to buy an additional ticket. A dedicated ticket is required on the Gatwick express. The journey time is around 35 minutes. From London Victoria take the underground lines District or Circle towards South Kensington station. Alternatively, marginally cheaper coach options to London Victoria are available at the airport. Please consult the website of the airport for more information <https://www.gatwickairport.com/>

Stansted airport. (Suggested transportation: train, but advanced booking is needed to avoid expensive fares.) From the airport, take the Stansted Express to Tottenham Hale <https://www.stanstedexpress.com/> . The journey time is around 40 minutes. From there take the Victoria underground line toward Victoria station, then switch to the District/Circle for South Kensington. Alternatively, cheaper coach options to London Victoria are available at the airport. Please consult the website of the airport for more information <https://www.stanstedairport.com/>

London City Airport. (Suggested transportation: DLR+underground.) This airport is served by the DLR service (pay by Oyster card). Take the DLR towards Canning Town. Switch to the underground Jubilee line. From the Jubilee line go to Green Park to take the Piccadilly line or to Westminster station to take the District or Circle line. On the Piccadilly/District/Circle go to South Kensington.

Luton Airport and Southend Airport. These two minor airports offer a train towards a major London train station (London Liverpool Street or London St Pancras International). From there you take the tube to South Kensington. Coach options are available from Luton towards Victoria <https://www.london-luton.co.uk/> . Coaches towards Victoria are **NOT** available from Southend Airport.

The **Eurostar** train connects Paris, Brussels and Amsterdam to London St Pancras Station (next to King's Cross station). From the train station take the Piccadilly underground line towards South Kensington.

There are many major train stations in London connected to the rest of the UK. Please check google maps for details on how to reach South Kensington station.

Travel by car (rented or personal) is discouraged. Uber or cabs are available. They may be your only option if your arrival flight is after midnight or your departure flight is before 7am.

Tickets

Cash is **not** accepted on London public transport. It is advised that you buy an Oyster card for bus or tube transportation, or you use your credit/debit contactless card. You can buy an Oyster card at the underground stations. When you leave London, you can return your Oyster card and obtain your deposit back (+ any remaining credit). The only other way to pay is by contactless or smartphone pay systems. However, be aware of your exchange rate fees (try Revolut or Monzo).




